SPEAKERS

Renée Azerbegi, LEED AP, CEM

Azerbegi is president of ambient energy (Golden, Colo.). She has 11 years of experience specializing in energy modeling, LEED™ green building rating documentation, lifecycle costing, renewable energy, energy audits, feasibility studies, green specifications and energy-efficient mechanical design. Azerbegi has provided sustainable design solutions to many building projects. She has a Master of Science in building systems engineering from the University of Colorado at Boulder and a Bachelor of Arts in environmental science and geography from the University of California at Berkeley. Azerbegi's portfolio includes numerous presentations, articles and publications on alternative energy sources, energy conservation opportunities, sustainable mechanical and electrical systems, green technologies, LEED™ and water conservation.

Randy Brown, FAIA, LEED AP

Brown founded Randy Brown Architects (RBA) in 1993 with the mission of bringing innovative and artistic architectural designs to his home state of Nebraska. His ambition: to teach people of the heartland that architectural solutions to their pragmatic needs and functional requirements could be creative and thought-provoking. Fifteen years later, RBA continues to educate and inspire the public by weaving award-winning architecture into everyday lives. Inspired by the rural landscapes and communities of Nebraska, Brown and his team have developed a unique approach to architecture that couples the best of modern, ecologically sensitive design with an appreciation of the natural landscapes and honest lifestyles of the heartland. He was honored with the AIA Young Architect Award in 2002 and in 2006, at age 39, he was elevated to the AIA College of Fellows.

Gary Lawrence

As urban strategies leader for Arup, a consulting and engineering firm, Lawrence provides thought leadership for sustainable urban development throughout the firm's 90 global offices and to the more than 10,000 engineers, designers, planners and scientists that the firm employs. Prior to joining Arup, Lawrence served as planning director for the City of Seattle, where he led the development of *Toward a Sustainable Seattle*, the first sustainability-focused comprehensive municipal plan in the world. Lawrence subsequently served as advisor to the Clinton administration's Council on Sustainable Development, the United Nation's Habitat II, the U.S. Agency for International Development, the Brazilian president's office, the British prime minister's office, and the Organization for Economic and Community Development (Paris) on matters of sustainable development and environmental policy.

Julian Lineham, PE, PA, C.Eng and Chris O'Hara, PE, PA

Lineham and O'Hara are founding principals of Studio NYL, a dynamic structural engineering design practice based in Boulder, Colo. Lineham spent the first 10 years of his career in London with some of England's leading structural engineering firms. His extensive experience includes work on a wide range of building ages, sizes, types and forms for a variety of educational, institutional, commercial and residential clients. O'Hara began his career in New York, where he was exposed to unique structural engineering projects in addition to more conventional building systems. Studio NYL has collaborated with many of the top designers in Colorado and elsewhere. Notable projects include the Kent Denver Performing Arts Center, Summit Restaurant Glass Wine Room, Merchant's Row and Wildwood Casino.

SPEAKERS

Sandra Mendler, AIA

Mendler is a nationally recognized design leader, author and advocate for sustainable design. A principal with Mithūn in San Francisco, Mendler has more than 20 years of professional experience leading the design effort for a variety of high-profile, innovative, high-performance projects. Mendler's commitment to sustainable design is rooted in her conviction that design excellence requires informed, relevant and inspired solutions. She has been an active member of the AIA Committee on the Environment (COTE) and served as chair from 1999-2001. She also contributed to the early development of the LEED™ Green Building Rating System™. Mendler is the co-author of two books and numerous articles, and her work is widely published in print and on the Internet. She has taught, lectured and served on peer-review and expert panels, and has been invited to speak at dozens of conferences and industry events. Mendler's goal is to broaden and elevate the discourse on design, thereby raising expectations and ultimately transforming the design and construction industry.

Gregory Papay, FAIA

Papay is managing partner of Lake|Flato Architects. His emphasis on merging the craft and science of architecture creates public buildings and places that are tactile and modern, environmentally responsible and authentic, artful and detailed. When he joined Lake|Flato 14 years ago, it was a 12-person firm working on small scale, locally focused projects. Under Papay's direction as managing partner since 1997, Lake|Flato has grown to a firm of more than 60 with a national focus to its design practice, more than 100 AIA design awards and the achievement of AIA 2004 Architecture Firm Award. In recent years, creating architecture for education has become Papay's passion. His efforts to promote design excellence extend beyond his practice and his region. He has lectured and juried extensively in the past decade, advocating for place-based architecture. Papay's work has been recognized with five national awards and six state and regional awards.

James Polshek, FAIA

Polshek has been a practitioner, educator and public advocate for more than five decades. Currently, he is senior design counsel to Polshek Partnership Architects, which he established in 1963. The firm has been recognized internationally for its artistic, managerial and technical virtuosity, and for the vitality of its multi-generational approach to practice. The firm has consistently created beautiful buildings that explore new ground formally, technically and functionally, and has created new models in response to advances in the scientific, technological, social, cultural and political spheres. Polshek received a Master of Architecture from Yale University School of Architecture (New Haven, Conn.) in 1955 and was a Fulbright Fellow at the Royal Academy of Fine Arts (Copenhagen) in 1956. He is a tenured professor of architecture at the Graduate School of Architecture, Planning and Preservation, Columbia University (New York) and was the school's dean of faculty from 1972 to 1987. He currently serves on the advisory boards of the New York School of Interior Design and the Lycée Français de New York.

SPEAKERS

Alex Steffen

Steffen has been the executive editor of Worldchanging since he co-founded the organization in 2003, as the next phase in a lifetime of work exploring ways of building a better future. In a very short time, Worldchanging has become the most widely-read sustainability-related publication on the Internet, with an archive of more than 7,000 articles by leading thinkers around the world. The site has played an important role in revealing formerly obscure innovations and groundbreaking ideas, thereby pushing forward the sustainability movement and assisting in the growth of its network. Steffen was the editor of Worldchanging's wildly successful first book, *Worldchanging: A User's Guide for the 21st Century* (Abrams, 2006), a 600-page compendium of writings from more than 60 noted leaders around the world. Steffen has written for numerous publications, and his work has been the subject of stories in *The New York Times*, *USA Today*, the *Los Angeles Times*, *The Wall Street Journal*, the *San Francisco Chronicle*, *Wired*, the *Guardian*, *The Seattle Times*, the *Associated Press* and elsewhere.

James Timberlake, FAIA

Timberlake is a founding partner of KieranTimberlake Associates. He received his Bachelor of Arts from the University of Detroit and his Master of Architecture from the University of Pennsylvania School of Design. He is a recipient of the Rome Prize from the American Academy in Rome (1982-83) and was an inaugural recipient of the prestigious Benjamin Latrobe Fellowship for architectural design research from the AIA College of Fellows in 2001. Additionally, KieranTimberlake Associates received the AIA 2008 Architecture Firm Award. Timberlake is an adjunct professor at the University of Pennsylvania School of Design and an endowed professor in sustainability at the University of Washington College of Architecture and Urban Planning (Seattle). He has co-authored two books: *Manual, The Architecture of KieranTimberlake* (Princeton Architectural Press, 2002) and *Refabricating Architecture* (McGraw-Hill, 2004). His forthcoming book, *Loblolly House: Elements of a New Architecture*, is a case study of a single building that shows a way forward to quality, productivity and sustainability.

Dr. Ken Yeang, Hon. FAIA

Yeang is one of the world's leading architects in ecological design and passive low-energy design. He has delivered more than 200 built projects, and his "bioclimatic" towers have had an impact around the world, fusing high-tech and organic principles. He actively has disseminated his vision through teaching and a series of books that are as concerned with the science of low-energy building as with the aesthetics of the end result. His contribution to leading edge and sustainable design extends far beyond landmark buildings. His thinking infuses peer-group discussions on building form and disposition of the public realm through the objectives of sustainability. His most recent book, titled *Eco Skyscrapers* (Images Publishing Group, 2007), is a detailed look at his signature "deep green" tall buildings.
